Life Lessons from Dr. Seuss

Course Structure: Through case studies and open discussions, we will explore the historical context behind Dr. Seuss' stories and the relevance of his lessons to the issues we face today. Some topics may have a guest speaker. In every class, we will also spend some time brainstorming ways we can work on the challenges brought up in these books. If students are interested, we can set aside time for working on a plan to address an issue of our choice. The last class may include an opportunity for students to present their action plans and get feedback from fellow students and guest reviewers.

Prerequisites: An open mind & the willingness to try green eggs and ham (vegetarian options available)

Readings:

- 1. **Dr. Seuss Books:** We will take turns reading Dr. Seuss books in class, occasionally watching the original animated short films or listening to audio recordings. To allow for more discussion time in class, books and supplemental reading materials may occasionally be assigned as homework, not to exceed 20-30 minutes a week.
- 2. Case Studies: We will also go over articles and case studies on topics related to the Dr. Seuss books of the week. Students are encouraged to regularly share information and recommended reading with the class.
